Director's Letter / Tom Van Winkle

Resilience is “the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties.” If there was ever a year to test our resilience, 2020 is most certainly it! But, unfortunately 2020 is just a typical year for the animals that come through our shelter.

It's a chilly, rainy day as I write this and I'm trying to think of something really inspirational to help us get through another day of what seems to be a never ending year of challenges, sadness and heartache. Then I looked over at my new best friend, Frank. In May of this year I lost my last best friend, Freckles, after 14 years of being together. I was heartbroken. 2020 had dealt me yet another blow.

But, in August I met Frank, a 7 year old Beagle mix with an underbite. He came to HHS by way of Tennessee. With a bare spot on his neck from a collar biting into him and missing patches of fur from fleas. I wanted a big dog, but instead ended up with my new best buddy: a 20-pound, barking, squirrel-chasing, crazy man. I couldn't be happier, yet I can't help but think of Frank and all of the animals at HHS when I think of resilience.

At one time or another, the vast majority of animals that come to HHS have had a home. Some of them have been good homes, others not so good, but they were part of a family. Then, through no fault of their own, they find themselves homeless and in a new and strange environment. There are other animals


everywhere and strange people always in a hurry, scurrying about. Then, it's night time and they are all alone in their kennels/cages. It is quiet, dark and lonely. And then it starts up again the next day, until a new family chooses them. Now they must start all over again. They have to figure out the new rules of the home, get used to new smells and most importantly, how to love a new family.

2020 has been a year I hope is never repeated. There have been a few bright spots, but overall, I'll be happy to see it go. When I think of the word resilience, I think of the millions of pets who become homeless every year, and realize 2020 is just “groundhog day” for them.

In no way do I want to minimize the heroic efforts of those staff and volunteers who come in every day to care for our animals. They too have earned the title of “resilient.” But this letter is focused on our animals, because it's easy to overlook the incredible changes they too have to endure.

To all creatures, human and animal, I say thank you for getting up every day and bringing joy to each other's lives, just as Frank is bringing joy to mine.

Farewell to a Friend

"The Executive Director at that time, Di Aldridge, told me she needed someone to manage the volunteers," said Mary. "Back then, there were about 35. Today there are about 350."

Mary took on that role, and eventually added on bookkeeping to her job description. In 1997, she added the title of mom when her son was born. "I would bring my baby to the shelter in a basket and time my work for when he was napping," said Mary.


As HHS grew in its mission, new programming like Pet Therapy and Humane Education was added on. Mary jumped in anywhere she was needed to help

expand HHS' work into the community, eventually giving up her volunteer management to take a larger role in finance and administration. "From the time I started to the time I left, we grew from 10 employees to 30, and our building almost tripled in size!" said Mary. "It has been so enjoyable seeing the industry, adoptions and programs grow. It's been like watching your kid grow up."

Mary is heading back to her roots by relocating with her husband to Charlottesville, Virginia. "I'll enjoy the mountains and a little bit more laid back pace and being near my family." Once she arrives, she's not sure she'll work in animal welfare again. "I am allergic to everything!" Ironic for someone who dedicated her career to helping animals. "I'm not sure what I'm going to do... it's a new chapter and the future is limitless."

Mary's sharp wit has brought levity to a job that can be very hard, and has brought joy to all of her co-workers. "We're so grateful to her for all of her kindness, dedication and most of all, the laughs," said Tom Van Winkle, Executive Director.

Fundraising Resilience

Dog Washes

Our Dog Spa Day event, sponsored by Tina Tzinares from State Farm in Hinsdale, offered socially distanced spa treatments for pups, including baths with Fresh Wave shampoo, nail trims, bandanas, and goody bags for pets and their people.

Because that was such a hit, we did it again a few weeks later in August, this time run by our very own Junior Board. They scrubbed pups, served up doggie ice cream, handed out goody bags and stayed safely apart and protected with masks.

Goat Yoga

Sponsored by our friends at Vintage Charm, we couldn't have been more thrilled with how this event came together. Baby goats from Blue Sky Farm were the stars of this event. Demand is high for another goat yoga, which we will do in the spring of 2021. Until then, Namaste to all of the attendees.

Adopt a Dog Month

To raise awareness of adoption and the importance of spay/neuter, Adopt a Dog month covered a lot of bases for us this year. We celebrated puppies by livestreaming them at play, as we shared training tips, talked about fostering and shared ways to help puppies in need. The event brought in loads of much-needed supplies from our wish list. Our Clear the Shelters Encore helped us get our harder to adopt dogs into loving homes. A \$1000 matching challenge from the Lucht Family in memory of their HHS rescue dog, Sampson, allowed us to waive fees on special dogs in need. Then Subaru of Countryside came forward with their Subaru Loves Pets program, donating \$100 for every dog adopted during Adopt a Dog Month. Their focus on "Underdogs" who are overlooked, aligned beautifully with our mission.

Last but not least, we debuted our new Training and Enrichment program, offering tips from our trainer, Bailey McConnell, and launching a series of classes designed for different levels of abilities, both in-person and virtual. *(Read more on page 9).*




Clear the Shelters

While Clear the Shelters looked different this year, we were still able to get 17 pets into loving homes on Clear the Shelters day, August 29. Since all shelters are struggling through the pandemic, this year's focus was on adoptions and donations.

Adoption fees were not waived, but we were able to provide everyone with a 50% reduction of fees on cats, as well as a reduced fee microchip and rabies clinic.

Courageous

Corndog: *Lost and Found*

When it comes to resilience, Corndog wrote the book on it. He was transferred to us from Animal Rescue Corps (ARC) in Tennessee at the end of summer 2019. He came in with two similar looking dogs, all rescued from a hoarding situation. All three had heartworms and were very shy. Corndog was the most under socialized of the group and posed a flight risk. “Not being socialized at that important age can cause them to run,” said Samantha Cheatham, Operations Manager, HHS. With loads of patience, socializing and TLC from staff and volunteers, as well as time in a foster home with a staff member, Corndog was finally ready for adoption.



He was adopted into a loving home. For reasons beyond his control, one year later he was returned. But in a moment of high drama, Corndog broke loose from his adopter just as he was being returned to us, and he took off into the nearby woods. Our staff launched into recovery mode with the help of some incredibly resourceful and knowledgeable volunteers who reached out after we posted Corndog on Lost Dogs Illinois. Considering how incredibly timid he still is, it took the help of these seasoned experts to get him back to us safely. With a campaign of flyers and social media, trail cameras, humane traps strung with meat, and liquid smoke that lured him to the trap, just four days after he broke free, he was brought back to our facility. He spent time in our offices decompressing, resting, soaking up warmth, comfort, food, and all of the love and attention our staff can lavish on him. After a full medical exam, he was put back up for adoption.

“We are very clear with adopters that he will always be shyer,” said Samantha. “His family will have to be extra diligent and make sure he is double-leashed on walks, that there are no breaches in a fenced-in yard, etc. He will never be the dog that goes to the dog park or Petco. He will have his safe place and will enjoy being there with his safe people. And we think he’d do really well with another dog in the house. We never give up hope that his perfect match is out there.”

At the time this newsletter was headed to the printer, Corndog was busy meeting potential adopters, in search of his perfect match.

Tungsten & Midwest: *Orphaned and Adopted*

What could be more sad than two kittens orphaned when their mother was hit by a car? After the trauma these two went through together, understandably, they were bonded for life. Shortly after arriving, they went into foster care for bottle feeding. They were given all the nutrition, care, love and TLC possible to help make up for them losing their mama too soon. As expected they grew incredibly attached to one another.

Likely as a result of their early trauma, they were both very shy and needed time to adjust to their surroundings, and absolutely needed to be adopted out together. Happily, they were given that chance when a wonderful adopter came forward to give these two their happy ending after a rough start to their young lives.

Roxy: Scarred and Discarded

This sweet girl came to us from Southern Illinois. Some facilities have a type of overnight “dumpster” where people can drop off their unwanted pets. That’s where she was found.

“Her whole face had scars and we can only speculate as to what caused them,” said Samantha Cheatham, HHS Operations Manager. “We know she did not have a good beginning in her first two years of life and that she has likely dealt with cruelty, based on her scarring and her being severely underweight.”

She was adopted out in the south but was returned right away. That’s when she came to us. Roxy is a bully mix and will start to look more like one as she gains weight. Roxy is the epitome of resilience and of living in the moment.

“Something happened to her to receive those scars, but she is still so sweet and loving and just wants to be by people,” said Samantha. “No matter what cruelties come their way, whether it’s not being fed or being physically abused, they still just love. That’s what makes them so great. They want their people and to be loved. Let’s love them and give them the respect they deserve.”

A wonderful adoptive family chose Roxy and she is now soaking up all the love they have to give her.

Roni: Hurt and Healed

Sometimes resilience takes the form of healing and time. That was the case for our Roni. He had been living outdoors since Christmas of 2019. A caring individual who lived nearby was feeding him as a community cat.

This sweet 5 year old boy had a tipped ear which indicated he was neutered and living outdoors. He had a bad wound on his back and was in horrible condition by the time he reached us for medical help.

He received multiple procedures to help him heal, including wound flushing, a tie-over, medicated bandage and a tail amputation. We imagine as an outdoor kitty, he received his wounds from fights. He successfully underwent multiple medical procedures and surgeries, proving he is a fighter himself.

After almost six months of procedures, surgeries and recuperation time, including TLC from his adoring fans at the shelter, Roni was finally up for adoption. It took a little while, but he eventually made his match with a family and is now living the sweet life in his home.



Humane Education: *Together-Apart Summer Camp*

PET THERAPY *Care for the Caregiver*

AMITA's Janet Kennedy knew this year would bring challenges like no other. She saw it in the faces of AMITA Health patients and families. She also saw the untiring dedication the medical staff provided helping to meet those challenges.

As part of AMITA Health's Mission Integration team for outpatient services, Janet's role is to ensure AMITA's values of compassion and dignity are the foundation of her programs. When thinking about new ways to support this goal, an idea emerged.

Care for the Caregiver was born. Supported by Hinsdale Humane Society's Therapaws Pet Therapy program, the idea was to bring teams of therapy dogs to medical staff at AMITA outpatient settings in La Grange, Hinsdale, and Bolingbrook, including medical office buildings supporting these hospitals. Visits are held outside, and safety protocols are met. "Due to COVID-19, our therapy pets cannot do the work they love - visiting schools, elder care facilities and hospitals," said Susan D'Alexander, Pet Therapy Program Manager. "This gives us a chance to share the power of animal interaction with others dealing with great stress during these unprecedented times,"

Becky Webb, Manager of AMITA Health La Grange Residency Program, sums it up this way: "Happiness really was a warm puppy for our residents. The dogs brought smiles, laughter, and much needed connection for our residents. We'd love to have them visit on a regular basis." The program is delivering. To date, fourteen Care for the Caregiver events have occurred since June 30 with more on the way. Per Janet, "We are so happy to give back to those who give so much." Our therapy animals agree.

The popular concept has grown to other area hospitals and even inspired finding new homes for dogs. Stella, an employee of RML Hospital in Hinsdale, volunteered to help at an event and met Theo the Basset, a Therapaws pet. The visit brought back many fond memories of her family pet and reminded her of her love for Bassetts. This inspired her to begin a search for a furry companion of her own. Says Stella, "Thank you HHS for the memories you create and the memories you bring back to us."



Training and Enrichment

We're thrilled to offer our new Training and Enrichment Program, designed to help all pet owners with a variety of positive-reinforcement training classes, and to help our shelter pets with mental and physical stimulation while they're with us.

Meet our Trainer, Bailey McConnell

Bailey has been involved in animal welfare her entire adult life. She is a Karen Pryor Academy Certified Training Partner and brings to the table her knowledge of applied behavior analysis as a trainer and as a shelter and rescue worker and volunteer.

HERE ARE SOME OF OUR NEW COURSE OFFERINGS:

Meet the Trainer

This class is a 45 minute to 1-hour meeting with a Q&A segment to discuss training goals and behavior concerns. We'll guide you to the training avenue best suited for you and your dog. There is no cost for this interactive webinar.

Puppy Socialization - Puppy Peer Group

Proper socialization is the key to a well-rounded adult dog. Bring your pup in for an hour to hang out with comparable sized and aged friends. We'll discuss puppy socialization and getting ahead of rising behavior concerns.

Puppy Pre-K

This 4-week class teaches basic tricks such as sit, paw, down and attention to the handler, while building positive associations to the scary things in life, such as the vet's office.

Best Friend Foundations

This is a 6-week skill-building class to learn about canine communication and how to approach basic behavior problems. Some topics; loose leash walk, polite greetings, and basic management tools to employ in your life.

Canine College


Take it to the next level in this 4-week class with canine learning theory and training more advanced behavior. We'll address topics like sensitivities and fear, recall and "leave it." Strengthen your bond with your dog and help solidify the basics.
