# Record Crowds at Pet Walk & Run 2017

In our 28th year of Pet Walk and our second year of adding a 5K run component to the event, record crowds of more than 500 were on hand to help support the mission of our shelter.

Held on Sunday, June 4th from 8am-noon in Katherine Legge Memorial Park, moderate weather provided ideal running conditions for the 116 registered runners and 400 attendees.

When the runners crossed the finish line in the park, they joined the hundreds of attendees who stayed for the entertainment and vendor offerings, as well as awards presentation by Judy Hsu, from ABC-7 Chicago.

"This year's event exceeded all of our expectations," said Mistie Lucht, Race Director. "From the Harley rider who led the runners, to the bubble art, agility and frisbee dogs, petting zoo, pony rides and our awesome vendors, there was so much fun for everyone this year."

# **Happy Campers**

Our first sessions of 6-8 year old summer campers learned about geckos, lizards, snakes, birds, ferrets and more, in addition to finding out how they can advocate for the humane treatment of all animals.

Did you know you should always keep at least two ferrets together because they are very social animals? Campers no doubt came home from Pet Camp full of knowledge about animal care and why the humane society is needed.

Fourth, fifth, and sixth graders learned about our area native animals and the people working to rescue and rehabilitate them at the Willowbrook Wildlife Center. They discovered how horses are helpful as therapy animals for people with disabilities at the Hanson Center. Finally, a trip to the Brookfield Zoo offered campers a glimpse behind the scenes at what it takes to care for exotic animals. (Field trips change yearly to accommodate repeat campers.)

Tweens in grades 7 and 8 focus on advocacy work in their camp, learning how they can make animals' lives better through political advocacy, personal choices, and the eventual career path they choose.

Camps run from 9-noon, meeting at Pet People in Western Springs, and are limited to 20 children per session. The \$175 fee includes a T-shirt, water bottle, daily snack, and Humane Society tote bag. # Ask a Vet

Dr. Keith True is a veterinarian at Animal Care Center of Downers Grove, which is currently in the process of building a new state of the art facility scheduled to be completed by the end of this year.

Q: What cues or behavior changes should I look for if my pet is not feeling well?

A: Anything from allergies, to respiratory infections, to orthopedic injuries are common during the warmer months since dogs are out and about and more active. Owners should look for changes to their pet's daily routine. Are they eating as normal?

Is their energy level decreased? Are you noticing coughing/sneezing, itchiness, or difficulty getting around? If you answered yes to any of these questions; it's time to call your veterinarian.

#### Q: Does my pet really need heartworm and flea/tick prevention?

A: Heartworm disease is a very serious life-threatening parasitic infection transmitted by mosquitos (yes, mosquitos can get inside). Heartworm is a very difficult and expensive disease to treat, but is preventable (cheaper too!) with a variety of different medications or injections available. Flea/tick prevention is just as important. Several diseases are carried by ticks, and flea infestations can be extremely difficult to resolve. Make sure to speak with your veterinarian to see which product is best for your pet.

#### Q: What are the most common diseases you see in dogs as a veterinarian?

A: Veterinarians see a wide variety of cases on each day. The most common is skin infections. During spring/summer/fall there are a wide variety of allergens pets are exposed to. Canine allergies tend to manifest as itchiness of the skin. This can lead to self-trauma and infection. Luckily for us, there are new medications and injections available that can keep your dog comfortable and itch-free.

# Ask the Trainer...

HHS Volunteer Coordinator and licensed Obedience Instructor Kym Iffert answers pet-related questions and offers advice.

Q. My dog is really active and needs a lot of exercise. How often should he be going out for walks?

A. There is a lot of pressure to exercise high energy dogs, and we are often told to walk 3 times a day, but is that really best? Chicago weather can work against our dogs. Remember that high temperatures put them at risk of heat stroke, paw burns and dehydration, and cold winter months can bring about dangers of frostbite and salt burns or sores. Multiple or long walks may create "Marathon Dogs": the dog that started out just walking around the block and after a few weeks, needs a mile before he's tired, then builds to 3 miles, 5, etc. This is how humans train for a Marathon, but not what the average pet owner with an active dog really needs.

What does your dog do that makes you feel he needs more? Is he jumpy, barky, attention seeking? Consider a training class. While a tired dog is a good dog, a well-trained dog is even better. Positive training not only teaches our dog good manners and alternate behaviors, it helps to create a stronger human-animal bond and engages your dog mentally, which will also help make him/her tired. (Think about those days you spend problem solving in front of a spreadsheet or following up on constant emails. It can be exhausting!) Is your dog destructive if not given multiple walks each day? Destructive chewing, stealing items, barking, digging, etc can often be signals of boredom or anxiety. In both cases, engaging your dog with mentally stimulating toys, using treat dispensers at meal-times instead of a basic food bowl, playing training games, making a "digging pit" and/or hiding treats in special toys in the yard or throughout your home can help a pet work though that excess energy in a positive way and teach more appropriate behaviors without taking up hours of your time or causing more problems. You may also consider acclimating your dog to a crate where he can spend time with safe, interactive toys to save your furniture, shoes and rugs.

When is your dog most active? Often the excitement of the whole family coming home will set off a flurry of running, jumping, barking and general chaos. Keeping him in a crate and/or ignoring your pup until he calms down is an easy way to teach him that general craziness will not get the attention he craves, but calm will earn him praise, pets and love.

Is your dog one of the handful that doesn't enjoy going for walks? I personally have a border collie mix that is constantly on alert while walking, ears pinned back, pacing back and forth, panting heavily, tail-tucked and pulls like mad to get back home. For months I tried to train her to walk nicely on a leash the way my others do, until I finally realized, she was anxious the entire time and miserable being taken out each day. A romp in the yard with a tennis ball, frisbee or flirt pole toy, along with some hide and seek games with the kids and she is engaged, worn out and happy!

Our dogs do need exercise, but think about what is best for Fido and family. When the kids go back to school, who will maintain those routines? The better option might be, rather than "training the marathon dog," opt for general obedience training, engagement and more mental stimulation for a happier, well-behaved and calm companion.

#### **Kennel Dedication**




Donors entered the kennel area at HHS to see the unveiling of the kennels and floors they made possible.
