Faragoi has been competing in Frisbee dog challenges for two years and said what he loves most is just the bond he gets from working with the dogs.

"It takes time, consistency and patience," Faragoi said. "Everybody thinks it takes a lot of time; it's not so much the amount of time, it's the quality of time. Just like kids."

The Windy City Agility Club also showed off its canines' skills in the obstacle course, which featured a tunnel, high jump and in-and-out poles.

Kim Debenedictis of Bloomingdale was there with her dog, Gazzoo. She said it takes a little more than a year
